Proceedings of Electors of President and Vice-President of the United States of America, in and for the State of Maryland.

On the second Monday of January being the tenth day thereof in the year Thirteen Hundred and Twenty-Five, the day appointed by the Constitution of Laws of the United States, on which the Electors for President and Vice-President of the United States of America are directed to assemble and perform the trust reposed in them, there appeared at the hour of noon in the Old Senate Chamber in the State House in the City of Annapolis (the time and place designated by Act of Assembly for the meeting of said Electors) the following gentlemen, who had been proclaimed by the Executive Authority of the State, to have been duly elected, Electors of President and Vice-President of the United States, in and for the State of Maryland, to wit:—

Frederick W. Page

Thomas P. Harton

Geor. B. Chenoweth

Wilford D. Dill

Henry W. Friere

James P. Curley

Harry E. Baker

The said Electors liberally qualified by taking the oath prescribed by the Constitution to be taken by all civil officers—

On motion of Geor. B. Chenoweth, Harry W. Shererombie was unanimously chosen President of the College, and upon taking the Chair expressed his appreciation of the compliment paid him by the College.

On motion of James P. Curley, James W. Munroe was elected Secretary of the College, and on motion of Mr. Dill, Geor. B. Chenoweth was elected Messenger.

It was then moved and ordered, that a Committee of Five be appointed to wait on the Governor and inform him that the College was organized, and to ask if he had any communications to make to it.

The Chair appointed James P. Curley and Frederick W. Page who waited on the Governor and received from him a copy of the Governor's Proclamation, viz—
