

Congress, 1795 (elected to fill vacancy; seated on January 2, 1795). **WEALTH DURING LIFETIME.** **PERSONAL PROPERTY:** assessed value £840.0.0, including 17 slaves, 1783; assessed value £521.0.0, including 16 slaves and 14 oz. plate, 1793; assessed value £416.0.0, including 11 slaves and 14 oz. plate, 1797; 13 slaves, Kentucky, 1800; 14 slaves, Kentucky, 1811; 16 slaves, Kentucky, 1812. **LAND AT FIRST ELECTION:** 976 acres in Montgomery County (700 acres from wife's dower, plus 276 acres that his wife inherited from her brother). **SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN LAND BETWEEN FIRST ELECTION AND DEATH:** purchased 2,009 acres in Maryland and Kentucky, 1784–1812; sold 906 acres in Montgomery County, 1784–1812. **WEALTH AT DEATH.** **DIED:** on November 13, 1829, in Elkton, Kentucky; buried on his estate in Elkton, Kentucky. **LAND:** owned ca. 2,985 acres in 1812, of which ca. 1,061 acres were in Kentucky and the remainder in Montgomery County.

ELLIOTT, WILLIAM (?–1756). **BORN:** of age by 1713; eldest son. **NATIVE:** at least second generation. **RESIDED:** on Kent Island, Queen Anne's County. **FAMILY BACKGROUND.** **FATHER:** William Elliott (?–1713), of Kent Island, Queen Anne's County; a carpenter. **MOTHER:** Elizabeth. **BROTHERS:** Thomas; Henry; John, a cooper; Joseph; and Benjamin. **SISTER:** Elizabeth. **MARRIED** Mary. **CHILDREN.** **SON:** John. **DAUGHTERS:** Elizabeth, who married Thomas Elliott Hutchings; (first name unknown), who married Matthew Griffith. **PRIVATE CAREER.** **EDUCATION:** literate. **RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION:** Anglican, Christ Church Parish, Kent Island, Queen Anne's County. **SOCIAL STATUS AND ACTIVITIES:** Mr., 1722; Gent., 1725. **OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE:** planter. **PUBLIC CAREER.** **LEGISLATIVE SERVICE:** Lower House, Queen Anne's County, 1722–1724, 1725–1727, 1728–1731, 1732–1734, 1734/35–1737. **LOCAL OFFICES:** justice, Queen Anne's County, 1732—at least 1734 (quorum, 1734); coroner, Queen Anne's County, appointed 1739; reader, Christ Church Parish, Queen Anne's County, license granted 1747. **MILITARY SERVICE:** captain, by 1727. **WEALTH DURING LIFETIME.** **LAND AT FIRST ELECTION:** at least 220 acres in Queen Anne's County (220 acres from his father). **WEALTH AT DEATH.** **DIED:** between April 1 and April 22, 1756, in Queen Anne's County. **PERSONAL PROPERTY:** TEV, £858.19.5 current money (including 21 slaves, 1 servant, 12 oz. 13 dwt. 10 gr. silver, and books); FB, £811.13.3. **LAND:** 220 acres in Queen Anne's County.

ELTONHEAD, WILLIAM (ca. 1616–1655). **BORN:** ca. 1616 in Eltonhead, Lancastershire, England; first son. **IMMIGRATED:** in 1643, apparently returned to England and reimmigrated in 1648 as a free adult. **RESIDED:** in Calvert or St. Mary's counties. **FAMILY BACKGROUND.** **FATHER:** John Eltonhead, of Middle Temple, England. **MOTHER:** Elizabeth, daughter of John Osbaldeston. **UNCLE:** Edward Eltonhead, of Henham, Essex, England, a master in Chancery in 1658. **BROTHER:** Richard Eltonhead, Esq., of Eltonhead, Lancastershire, England. **SISTER:** Jane, who married first, Robert Moryson, of Kecoughtan, Virginia, and second, in 1649 *Cuthbert Fenwick* (1614–1655). **MARRIED** by 1649 Jane (1617–1659), widow of both Thomas Smith and Philip Taylor (ca. 1610–?). **CHILDREN.** **STEPSON:** Thomas Taylor (ca. 1643–1696), the sheriff of Dorchester County in 1669 and a justice (quorum) of Dorchester County by 1679, who married Frances. **PRIVATE CAREER.** **EDUCATION:** literate; admitted to St. John's College, Cambridge University, 1631; admitted to the Middle Temple, London, England, 1632/33. **RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION:** probably a Protestant. **SOCIAL STATUS AND ACTIVITIES:** brought six men servants, one maid, and one boy with him when he immigrated to Maryland; in partnership with his uncle Edward Eltonhead to transport 100 persons to Maryland for a grant of 10,000 acres; probably recruited by *Cecilius Calvert, 2nd Lord Baltimore* (1605–1675), in an effort to attract influential Protestants to Maryland; often returned to England and rarely served as a councilor. **OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE:** planter. **PUBLIC CAREER.** **LEGISLATIVE SERVICE:** Upper House, 1650–1650/51 (appointed, but did not serve). **PROVINCIAL OFFICE:** Council, 1649–1655. **STANDS ON PUBLIC/PRIVATE ISSUES:** supported Lord Baltimore against the Parliamentary Commissioners. **WEALTH DURING LIFETIME.** **LAND AT FIRST ELECTION:** a 2,000-acre manor, 1649 (probably held land in partnership with his uncle). **WEALTH AT DEATH.** **DIED:** on March 25, 1655, when captured and executed at the Battle of the Severn. **PERSONAL PROPERTY:** TEV, 14,202 pounds of tobacco (including 2 servants). **LAND:** 1,130 acres.

ELZEY, ARNOLD (ca. 1758–1818). **BORN:** ca. 1758, probably in Somerset County. **NATIVE:** at least second generation. **RESIDED:** in Somerset County; Baltimore County, 1779; Princess Anne Hundred, Somerset County, 1783; Washington, D.C., 1801. **FAMILY BACKGROUND.** **FATHER:** possibly Arnold Elzey, Gent. (ca. 1724–?). **MARRIED** by 1796 Henrietta (?–1835), daughter of Ephraim
