STEPSONS:** John Riatt, Jr., who married Hannah, sister of *Nathan Hammond* (1731–1811); George Riatt. **STEPDAUGHTERS:** Ann Riatt, who married by 1767 John Duckett; Barbara Riatt (1743–?), who married Philip Hammond (1744–1799), brother of *Nathan Hammond* (1731–1811); and Harriott Riatt (?–by 1802), who married by 1767 Marmaduke Winell. **PRIVATE CAREER. EDUCATION:** literate. **RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION:** Anglican, St. Anne's Parish, Anne Arundel County, until 1777 when he moved to Frederick County. **SOCIAL STATUS AND ACTIVITIES:** Gent., 1759. **OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE:** merchant; farmer; land speculator. Maintained a store in Annapolis in 1761 until at least 1773; in partnership with *Stephen West* (1727–1790) 1761. After 1782 Hammond called himself a farmer. **PUBLIC CAREER. LEGISLATIVE SERVICE:** Lower House, Frederick County, 1783 (Claims). **OTHER STATE OFFICE:** commissioner and endorser of bills of credit, 1776–1783. **LOCAL OFFICES:** sheriff, Annapolis, 1753–1754; churchwarden, St. Anne's Parish, Anne Arundel County, 1769–1770, 1774–1775; St. Anne's Parish Vestry, Anne Arundel County, 1770–1773, 1775–1777; trustee of the poor, Anne Arundel County, in office in 1772. **WEALTH DURING LIFETIME. PERSONAL PROPERTY:** settled the estate of John Riatt with his wife Ann; final distribution was made in 1769. Her portion was £171.17.4 sterling, £1,404.11.2 current money, and 3,036 pounds of tobacco. Riatt also had held a lease to part of a lot in Annapolis and Hammond leased the remainder of the lot in 1762. Assessed value £391.0.0, including 12 slaves, Anne Arundel County 1783. **ADDITIONAL COMMENTS:** Subleased land and a store near the dock in Annapolis after 1777. By 1798 Hammond had two tenants on his Anne Arundel County land. **LAND AT FIRST ELECTION:** 1,512 acres in Anne Arundel and Frederick counties, plus 2 lots in Annapolis and a 97-year lease on 1 lot near the dock in Annapolis. (480 acres in Frederick County inherited from his father, 152 acres in Frederick County inherited upon the death of sister his Caroline, ca. 1772). **SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN LAND BETWEEN FIRST ELECTION AND DEATH:** patented 40 acres in Frederick County in 1790 and 1798; probably sold his 2 lots in Annapolis before 1798; purchased ca. 200 acres in Anne Arundel County in 1801 and sold 687 acres in that county in 1802 and 1803; purchased 2,265 acres in Kentucky prior to 1802. **WEALTH AT DEATH. DIED:** on November 4, 1811, in Frederick County; buried in Mt. Olivet Cemetery, Frederick County. **LAND:**

1,065 acres in Frederick and Anne Arundel counties, plus a lease on 1 lot in Annapolis, and 2,265 acres in Kentucky.

HAMMOND, NICHOLAS (1758–1830). **BORN:** on May 26, 1758, on the Isle of Jersey, England. **IMMIGRATED:** by 1780 from Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. **RESIDED:** in Cambridge, Dorchester County, 1780; Easton, Talbot County, 1798; built "St. Aubins," Talbot County, 1808. **FAMILY BACKGROUND. FATHER:** Nicholas Hammond, immigrated in 1730 from the Isle of Jersey, England, to Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. He had returned to the Isle of Jersey by 1758. **MOTHER:** Margaret Lampriere. **MARRIED** first, in 1780 his cousin Sarah George (?–1787), of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. **MARRIED** second, in 1792 Rebecca (1762–1801), daughter of *Henry Hollyday* (ca. 1725–1789); granddaughter of both *James Hollyday* (1696–1747) and *George Robins* (1697–1742); step-granddaughter of *William Goldsborough* (1709–1760); niece of *James Hollyday* (1722–1786), *Margaret Robins* (1734–1808), who married *William Hayward* (?–1791), *Henrietta Maria Robins* (1736–1791), who married *James Lloyd Chamberlaine* (1732–1783); half niece of both *Edward Lloyd* (1711–1770) and *Richard Lloyd* (1717–1786). Her brothers were Henry (?–died young); *James Hollyday* (1758–1807); Thomas (1760–1823); and Henry (1771–1850). Her sisters were *Henrietta Maria* (1750–1832), who married *Samuel Chamberlaine* (1742–1811); Sarah (1753–1829); *Anna Maria* (1756–1817), who married *George Gale* (1756–1815); *Elizabeth* (1768–1810); and *Margaret* (1774–?). Her first cousin was *Henrietta Maria Chamberlaine* (?–1804), who married *William Hayward, Jr.* (ca. 1758–1834). **CHILDREN. SON:** Nicholas (1795–1831), a physician, who married in 1823 *Anne Caroline*, daughter of *Howes Goldsborough* and wife *Mary*. **DAUGHTERS:** *Anna Maria*, who married in 1818 her first cousin *James Lloyd Chamberlaine* (1785–1844), son of *Samuel Chamberlaine* (1742–1811); *Rebecca Hollyday* (1801–?), who married in 1833 *Rev. Robert William Goldsborough*. **PRIVATE CAREER. EDUCATION:** sent from England to Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, to study law, ca. 1772. **RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION:** Anglican, St. Peter's Parish, Talbot County. **SOCIAL STATUS AND ACTIVITIES:** Gent., 1785; Esq., 1789; Freemason, participated in the establishment of the first lodge formed in Dorchester County, No. 29, delegate from Lodge No. 29 to the convention which organized the Grand Lodge; Hammond was elected junior grand warden in 1789, and senior grand warden in 1790, and
