

Thomas Goldsborough (ca. 1728–1793). **CHILDREN.** SON: Richard. **DAUGHTERS:** Mary Watkins Stevens, who was a widow by 1774; (first name unknown), who married John Fauntleroy (?–1785). **PRIVATE CAREER.** **EDUCATION:** literate. **RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION:** Anglican, St. John's Parish, Caroline County. **SOCIAL STATUS AND ACTIVITIES:** Gent., by 1761. **OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE:** planter, by 1761; farmer, by 1778. **PUBLIC CAREER.** **LEGISLATIVE SERVICE:** Lower House, Caroline County, 1778–1779 (Claims 3), 1779–1780, 1782–1783 (elected to the 1st session to fill vacancy), 1783. **LOCAL OFFICES:** St. John's Parish Vestry, Caroline County, elected 1768 and 1770; commissioner, Caroline County, appointed 1774; judge, Court of Appeals, appointed under the Act to Procure Troops for the American Army, Caroline County, appointed 1778. **WEALTH DURING LIFETIME.** **PERSONAL PROPERTY:** assessed value £485.0.0, including 17 slaves, 1783. **LAND AT FIRST ELECTION:** 889 acres in Caroline County (acquired by patent and purchase). **SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN LAND BETWEEN FIRST ELECTION AND DEATH:** bought 150 acres in Caroline County, 1774; sold all of his Caroline County land by 1780. **WEALTH AT DEATH.** **DIED:** possibly in Kentucky; size of estate unknown.

KENNARD (KENARD), PHILIP (?–1732). **BORN:** probably in Scotland; of age by 1685. **IMMIGRATED:** probably from Scotland. **RESIDED:** probably at "Drayton," Kent County. **MARRIED** first, by 1688, Sarah, widow of Capt. Joseph Hopkins, a Cecil County commissioner. Sarah was the sister of Col. Edward Carter of Nansemond County, Virginia. **MARRIED** second, on December 8, 1708, Elizabeth (Mary), widow of William Bailey (Bally, Bayley), daughter of *Charles James* (?–1698). Her brother was Charles James. Elizabeth subsequently married John Howell of Kent County, a cooper. **CHILDREN.** SON: *Philip Kennard* (?–ca. 1739/40). **STEPSONS:** Joseph Hopkins, Jr. (?–1717), who married Sarah Pearce; William Bailey (Bayley), Jr. (1704–1735), a bricklayer. **STEPDAUGHTERS:** Judith Hopkins, who married Joseph Skidmore; Ann Hopkins, who married George Warner; and Sarah Hopkins. **PRIVATE CAREER.** **EDUCATION:** literate by 1709. In 1690, however, he was fined for refusing to take the oath of office as a Cecil County justice, claiming that he could neither read nor write. **RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION:** Anglican, St. Paul's Parish, Kent County. **SOCIAL STATUS AND ACTIVITIES:** Mr., by 1732; Gent., by 1732. **OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE:**

planter; merchant by 1716. **PUBLIC CAREER.** **LEGISLATIVE SERVICE:** Lower House, Kent County, 1722–1724, 1725–1727, 1728–1731. **LOCAL OFFICES:** commissioner/surveyor to lay out Chester Town, 1730; justice, Kent County, 1729–1732. **STANDS ON PUBLIC/PRIVATE ISSUES:** at his death he provided for the manumission of a male slave after one year's time. **WEALTH DURING LIFETIME.** **LAND AT FIRST ELECTION:** at least 1,194 acres in Kent County and possibly Cecil County (894 acres through personal acquisition, at least 300 acres through marriage, plus unspecified acreage that his wife inherited). **SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN LAND BETWEEN FIRST ELECTION AND DEATH:** purchased and patented 474 acres in Kent County between 1723 and 1731; deeded as a gift 170 acres in Kent County to his stepson, 1725; obtained from this same stepson 300 acres in return for unspecified acreage over which Kennard had control through his marriage, 1727. **WEALTH AT DEATH.** **DIED:** between November 28, 1731, and August 17, 1732; will probated in Kent County. **PERSONAL PROPERTY:** TEV, £2,409.10.3 current money (including 15 slaves, 4 silver spoons valued at £2.8.0, and a pair of hand millstones); FB, £2,059.4.4. **LAND:** ca. 1,498 acres in Kent and possibly Cecil counties.

KENNARD, PHILIP (?–ca. 1739/40). **BORN:** in Kent County, probably at "Drayton," his father's plantation; only son of father. **NATIVE:** second generation. **RESIDED:** in Kent County. **FAMILY BACKGROUND.** **FATHER:** *Philip Kennard* (?–1732). **MOTHER:** Sarah. **STEPMOTHER:** Elizabeth. **HALF BROTHER:** Joseph Hopkins, Jr. (?–1717). **STEPBROTHER:** William Bailey, Jr. (1704–1735). **HALF SISTERS:** Ann Hopkins; Judith Hopkins; and Sarah Hopkins. **MARRIED** Sarah. **CHILDREN.** **SONS:** John (?–1743), who married in 1738/39 Sarah Pearce Hopkins Rogers, a widow; Joseph; and Philip (?–by 1760). **DAUGHTERS:** Mary, who married *George Wilson* (ca. 1696–1748/49); Sarah. **PRIVATE CAREER.** **EDUCATION:** literate. **RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION:** Anglican. **SOCIAL STATUS AND ACTIVITIES:** Gent., by 1723. **OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE:** merchant, by 1733; planter. **PUBLIC CAREER.** **LEGISLATIVE SERVICE:** Lower House, Kent County, 1734/35–1737 (Aggrievances 1, Cv, 2–4), 1738 (Aggrievances). **LOCAL OFFICE:** justice, Kent County, 1732 (probably appointed as a result of father's illness or death). **WEALTH DURING LIFETIME.** **LAND AT FIRST ELECTION:** at least 1,912 acres in Kent County (possibly 1,310 acres from his father, part of which was held for his three minor
