

Maryland Lynchings.

The record of lynchings in Maryland during the past fifteen years is as follows:

May 13, 1891—Asbury Green, colored, lynched at Centreville for felonious assault.

May 17, 1892—James Taylor, colored, lynched at Chestertown.

June 8, 1893—Isaac Kemp, colored, one of twelve colored men arrested in Somerset county for the murder of Edward Carver, killed by a mob which broke into the Princess Anne jail.

October 20, 1894—Stephen Williams, colored, of Prince Georges county, lynched for an assault on a white woman.

March 16, 1895—Sallie Dean, the 14-year-old daughter of Jacob Dean, near Harmony, Caroline county, was found killed. Marshall E. Price was convicted of her murder and afterward lynched.

March 28, 1895—Jacob Hensen, colored, was convicted for killing Daniel F. Shea, at Ellicott City, and was lynched.

November 16, 1895—James Brown, colored, lynched at Frederick.

June 9, 1897—William Andrews, colored, alias "Cuba," who assaulted Mrs. Benjamin E. Kelly, in Somerset county, was killed by a mob in Princess Anne after he had been sentenced to death.

May 25, 1898—Garfield King, colored, lynched at Salisbury for murder.

December 31, 1906—Henry Davis, colored, who committed a felonious assault on Mrs. John Reid, was taken from Annapolis jail, lynched and shot to pieces.
