SALISBURY LYNCHING

Horror And Indignation Succeeds A Spasm Of Frenzy And Lawlessness.

THE AUTHORITIES AROUSED

Judge Holland Says It Was A Shame And A Disgrace.

Consultation With The State's Attorney And The County Commissioners—Determined Effort To Be Made To Bring The Ringleaders In The Outrage To Punishment—Men Buying Arms.

[Special Dispatch to the Baltimore Sun.]
SALISBURY, Md., May 26.—The lynching of the young colored man, Garfield King, at an early hour this morning has aroused great indignation in Salisbury, where the people are orderly and law-abiding. The citizens stand in horror that such a brutal crime was committed under the very nose of the court and to be powerless to stay the mob. Hundreds of men stood in groups about the city and discussed the whole affair. Several hundred people viewed the body as it lay in the old engine-house, where it was placed by Sheriff Dashiell after being cut down.

The horror of the situation impressed itself upon the public mind when the bullet-riddled and mutilated corpse of the poor wretch was seen, and it was realized what a small chance the victim had in the hands of more than a hundred uncontrolled men. The body presented a most shocking sight, with its fifty or more pistol and gunshot wounds all over it. The people were eager for copies of THE SUN, which contained the only detailed report of the tragedy.

A jury of inquest was empaneled by Justice Trader, consisting of B. H. Parker, Samuel Gunby, Lemuel Malone, Frank Waller, Dr. L. S. Bell, G. J. Schneck, Wesley Hearn, Harry Dennis, W. I. Todd, L. M. Dashiell, Dr. E. W. Humphreys and John Polk.

After hearing the evidence of Sheriff Dashiell the jury adjourned until Friday afternoon at 4 o'clock.

No effort has been made to capture any of the lynchers. Many of the men were unmasked, but the extreme darkness outside the prison and the dim light inside made it almost impossible to distinguish faces. The sentiment of the best people in the county is very much against such acts of violence, but the fact that a majority of the lynchers were residents of the outside districts relieves them somewhat for responsibility.

The colored residents are sullen and angry, but the counsel of the wiser heads among them will prevail to avert any trouble. The dying declaration of Kenney, who was murdered by the negro, together with the testimony of several other white men, was to the effect that King delib-

erately waited for Kenney to come out of the store and shot him on sight.

During the existence of Wilcomico county there have been several murders, none of which resulted in hanging, and the fear that King would escape with a few years in the penitentiary, and possible pardon in a short time, had much to do with the lynching, but it was no excuse for such a shocking crime.

To THE SUN correspondent this afternoon, Judge Holland said: "It was a shocking, and to me, a very unexpected crime. It is a burning shame that the fair fame of this community should be so darkened and disgraced. We have not far to look back to see very recent examples how lawless acts like these repeat themselves and grow in recklessness and ferocity, and we have not far to look ahead to see the natural and ultimate result—entire disregard of all law and government. I had returned from Snow Hill during the day, and gave no credence to a rumor I heard that afternoon. I am told an attempt to warn me that night was prevented. The State's attorney, the president of the board of county commissioners and I have consulted, but I cannot say what steps will be taken."

Several men from the neighborhood of where Garfield King lived arrived in Salisbury this afternoon and visited all the stores which sell revolvers and ammunition, and purchased a good lot. They brought the report that the negroes in the district were massing and had sent out threats against the whites, and these men came quick for additional guns and ammunition. The whites say they will quell any disturbance in their district, even to the extent of exterminating the blacks.

The corpse of the victim of the lynching remained at the engine house until late this afternoon awaiting someone to claim it. King's father sent word he would be here this afternoon, but at 4 o'clock the sheriff received a telegram from him saying he could not get here and asking that the body of his son be given a decent burial in the Potter's field. The body was turned over to Undertaker Hill, who buried it.

A most disgusting lot were the relic hunters. Every thread of the rope used to lynch King was cut up and carried off by crowds. The rear of the courthouse is riddled with bullets and buckshot that missed the victim last night.

It is believed there is some strong inducement at work to discover the leader of the lynchers and bring him and his gang to justice.
