Wright Smith Lynched. Wright Smith, colored, who assaulted Mrs. James Morrison, wife of Capt. James Morrison, a white woman, on the night of Friday, Septem ber 2, at her home near Jones Station, in the Third district, was taken from the jail here Wednesday morning at 2 o'clock, by a moband shot to death

At two o'clock the bell rang at the front jail door. Watchman Thomas J. Duvall went to the door, supposing an officer was there with a prisoner. He took down the inside iron har, and as soon as he did the door was furst open and a half dozen revolvers were pointed at his head. Behind them pointed at ms nead. mental them were masked men, and to the rear of them more armed men. Without a word they forced the watchman to the second floor, and then they demanded the keys to the corridor, which be gave them. The door of the corridor seeing open, and straight to the cell went the men. The cell door was thrown open and the prisoner ordered to come out. Neither the assailants or the doomed man had a word to say. By this time the lynchers, thirty in number, crowded the jail corridors, some in light white clothes and masks, and some without masks. Watchman Duvall says be could not make out any person indi-vidually, nor could be tell whether they were young or middle-aged men. The prisoner was compelled to go be-fore the mob. He walked down the stairs to the front door and out. He ne ther offered resistance nor attered a word until he reached the front steps on Calvert street.

There was some difficul virigetring through the door, and in the senfile Smith got away and started to run, yelling "murder." The mob began soling "murder." The mob began firing and pursuing as he turned up Northwest screet toward the City Cemetery.
