Down into Kentucky, recently went Novelist Theodore Dreiser to investigate and preach against conditions among striking coal miners in Harlan county.

Out to California, more recently, journeyed Mayor James J. Walker of New York to plead with Gov. Rolph to wipe out the stain of 15 years of injustice to Tom Mooney and Warren Billings.
