

GRAND JURY RESUMES.

County Inquest is Again in Session And Will Hear Colored Man Chase This Afternoon.

Who incited or led the mob that broke into the lock-up at Brooklyn on the night of Christmas Eve and took King Johnson, the negro out and lynched him, was the question which was again taken up by the Anne Arundel county grand jury when that body re-assembled this morning.

Just what line the jury's investigation took during the morning session is not known, as no witnesses were heard before the noon recess.

Charley Chase, the colored witness of Johnson's shooting of Frederick Sewab who, as a witness, was also a prisoner in the lock-up the night the mob took Johnson from the cell next to his, was brought from the jail and kept in waiting for the call of the jury all morning. He was not called, but will, it is understood, be made to tell the inquest this afternoon what he knows of what went on in the lock-up the night of the lynching.

In connection with conditions in the Brooklyn police force, in whose custody the negro was at the time the mob took him, it had been expected that there would be a shake-up in the force when the annual appointments are made by the County Commissioners at their regular meeting today.

However, there being a number of other matters demanding attention, the appointment of their subordinate officers was postponed to next Tuesday when the board met. At the same time it is expected that President Smith and the committee named with him will make their report this afternoon with some recommendations following their inspection of the conditions in and about the Brooklyn lock-up.
