

We published two weeks ago an account of the tarring and feathering of James L. Bowers, in Kent county. The Delaware Republican of Thursday has the following letter in relation to subsequent results growing out of it:

EXCITEMENT in Kent county—a gentleman writing from Bel Air, Kent county, on the 18th inst., says: We are in the midst of one of the greatest excitements that has ever been in this county. It grew out of the tarring and feathering of Mr. Jas. L. Bowers, on last night two weeks. I am well acquainted with him, and always found him to be very clever and obliging: his wife is a lady who treats every person well. All that they can prove against Bowers is, he is opposed to slavery. In the night he was deceived under false pretences by a stranger who said he had broken down, and asked Mr. Bowers to assist him. Mr. B. in the kindness of his heart went to the gate and was caught by a gang lying in wait. Mr. Bowers made alarm which reached his wife, and she ran to his assistance, and commenced in good earnest to assist some of the party for which she was so injured that D. M. was many months of her life for some time, she being about seven months in pregnancy. On the next morning Mr. Bowers went to Chestertown before Esq. Graves, and made out to the following persons, and the Squire put them under bond of \$500 each, for their appearance at next court: George H. Handy, Josiah King, M. Harris Beck, P. Thomas P. Francis, Isaac Perkins, Samuel Baker, William T. Baker, Frisby
