

Baltimore April 10th 1830

Dear Sir,

I have just received your letter, inclosing one to Doctor John W. Anderson, by Dorsey Matthews - together with a Bank note for \$5. Dorsey started yesterday morning, in the Steam Boat for Norfolk, consigned to Mr John de Phail, the colonization society's agent there. I gave him \$5, which was sufficient to pay his passage thither; so that the sum is closed by you ~~was~~ quite enough. I have written to Mr de Phail, and enclosed to him, yours to Dr Anderson, which he will give to Dorsey. The Montgomery was advertised to sail to-day; but will no doubt be, as usual, delayed some days; so that the mail will transmit the letter, to go by the boy, in due time. I sent Dorsey off yesterday, to make all sure, and to avoid running any risk of a too prolonged stay in Baltimore. While here, he was under the charge, more particularly, of a zealous, intelligent, and very highly respectable colored man, a Methodist clergyman, who had his knowledge acquired in Libinia to his great advantage; and Dorsey, for the nonce, was made of considerable importance, as the temporary apostle of the Cause of African Colonization. He is now on his way back to the settlement & has my most sincere wishes for his prosperity, and the right enjoyment of that Liberty, which he will now for the first time, really possess.
