Extract of a letter from Gen. Lafayette to a gentleman of this city, dated Louisville, May 12.

"In the night of the 8th and 9th instant, we ran foul of a snag, which lay concealed two feet under water, and so well inflated our steam boat, that it pierced thro' our upper deck, and sunk the boat in a few minutes. We had time, however, to come out of the ladies cabin, before the water had penetrated through the partition, and all landed safely without any life being lost. The Paragon, which was descending the river in the morning, was good enough to take us on board and bring us to this place.
